
"They Need a Cow"

"These children don't need a cup, they need a cow," thought Dan West.

West was frustrated that his volunteer efforts during the Spanish Civil War of the 1930s did not seem to be helping enough people. Day after day, hungry children begged for the food that he distributed, but the provisions that he gave to one, he had to deny to another. (1) West decided that simply bestowing food would not improve lives. (2) People needed a way to refurbish their own food supplies. Thus, Operation Heifer, now Heifer International, was born.

Heifer International gives livestock—heifers (young cows), goats, and even bees—to people in need. These animals provide renewable sources of food, such as milk and honey. (3) However, giving one family a goat, while ignoring another family, would *abet* inequality. So any family that receives livestock is required to give the animal's first born offspring to another needy family. (4) Or the family can keep the offspring and *offset* the livestock gift by giving another family enough money to buy its own animal.



Early missions of Heifer International brought cowhands to war-torn Europe, in the 1940s. (5) In countries like Poland, the organization provided *deliverance* from poverty, as farmers once again were able to produce their own food. (6) At first, animals and volunteers traveled by ship, but the process was expedited when they began to travel by plane. In an account of his journey to Korea, cowboy Newton S. Goodridge paints a vivid picture of traveling on a plane with 100 goats, 600 rabbits, and an estimated 1,500,000 bees! Heifer International has helped more than 4.5 million farm families in over a hundred countries to become self-reliant.

A terrible civil war in Mozambique pushed hundreds of thousands of people from their lands. (7) These refugees were forced to seek sanctuary in neighboring countries. (8) Seventeen years after the war began, a treaty pacified the country. (9) When people returned from their havens, they had no livestock and found that years of violence had turned their once-fertile land to dust. (10) In 1995, Heifer International interceded by supplying goats to families. By 1999, more than 1,600 baby goats had been given to others.

Some aid recipients have achieved such success for themselves that they have been able to increase the required livestock gift. In 2001, Ganga Devi Khanai received two goats from Heifer International. Within a year, she had enough money to pay for her children's schooling and to buy a water buffalo. That animal helped her to farm and provided milk for her to sell. Ganga was required to pass on two goats to others, but in gratitude, she decided to give a third goat. Ganga also helped to found a cooperative business that funds community schooling for women.

The mooing of cows, the bleating of goats, and the buzzing of bees are all signs that Heifer International is on the way. Its volunteers spread dignity and hope to people worldwide.
